"What are those?", the volunteer asked as she stocked produce from an early morning shopping trip. "Well, we have lemon grass, daikon radishes, jicama, plantains, pomegranates, papayas, and mangoes." The loaded cart full of fresh pineapple, berries, carrots and onions were easily recognizable. As UCOM helped hundreds of families put food on their tables for Thanksgiving and prepares to help hundreds more at Christmas, we want to offer culturally appropriate fruits and vegetables.

Our neighbors are a diverse and wonderful group with families from all over the world including Vietnam and Myanmar, Ghana and Sudan, Germany and lately several refugee families from Ukraine.

UCOM also serves a large Hispanic (Latinx) population and while some might think of this group as monocultural this could not be further from the truth. Our Latinx neighbors hail from Guatemala, Cuba, Mexico, El Salvador, the Dominican Republic, Columbia, Honduras and more and each have their own cultural and family traditions.

While a few of our Mexican neighbors were talking about their recipes for pozole or tamales (a big debate over whether to wrap in banana leaves or corn husks) some of our Dominican neighbors were sharing their love of San Cocho, a vegetable stew. A Cuban neighbor chimed in with a pitch for platanos maduros (fried ripe plantains) and a Columbian neighbor mentioned arepas as a holiday favorite.



Each of us celebrates the holidays with so many rich food traditions from our own cultural heritage. Recipes get handed down from generation to generation, and favorites from our childhood take us on a trip down memory lane. Think about your own holidays. What does your table look like?
